Course description

This course helps students develop an incarnational Trinitarian theological approach to several common elements of pastoral ministry including administration of baptism and the Lord's Supper, worship planning, preaching, pastoral care, evangelism, discipleship, church administration, and family ministry.

Estimated workload: For a student to do well in this course, the student will need to invest a total of 144 hours, or about 12 hours per week of reading, participating on the website, and writing papers.

Requirements and assignments

1. **Read the lectures.** Lectures will be posted on Mondays. (Approximately 1.5 hours per week.)
1. **Participate in forum discussions.** In most courses, part of the learning that occurs comes through discussion and interaction with other students. In an online class, this is done through comments posted on a discussion forum. (Approximately 3 hours per week.) This accounts for 40 percent of the final grade.
2. **Read the textbooks.** They total about 850 pages, or about 85 pages each week. (Approximately 6.5 hours per week.)
3. **Listen to videos and podcasts.** Throughout the course, various videos and podcasts will be posted. (Approximately 4 hours total throughout the course.)
4. **Midterm reflection paper.** Three-page paper on the learning in the course to date. (Approximately 8 hours total.) This accounts for 15 percent of the final grade.
5. **Final integrative paper.** Ten to twelve page final paper that addresses material presented in the course, demonstrating critical thinking grounded in an incarnational Trinitarian worldview. (Approximately 30 hours total.) This accounts for 45 percent of the final grade.
